
Charley Harper Murals Unveiled

Brett Harper, son of renowned West Virginia native artist Charley Harper, traveled from Cincinnati, Ohio, to Buckhannon to attend the evening unveiling of four wildlife murals for the Art In Public Places Program. The murals now showcased in the Traders Alley Arts District ("Homebody," "Shadow Dancers," "Unzipped," and "Ladybugs Hibernating") are all images designed by his father.

"It's an honor, and really, Buckhannon is ground zero for anybody who's interested in Charley Harper's early life in terms of the sites where he lived and where he frequented that inspired him to draw and paint. To me, it's a lot of love given back to me by the community, and I always felt welcome in West Virginia from the time I was a child," the younger Harper commented.

Art In Public Places Program: Sail Fence Completed





The Sail Fence is the largest public sculpture in Buckhannon to date, at 12 ft tall and 60 ft long. It was unveiled on June 29, 2019.

ART26201 and the City of Buckhannon celebrated the unveiling of The Sail Fence as a colorful new addition to the Art In Public Places Program in the Traders Alley Arts District during a special ceremony on June 29, 2019.

Before the City partnered with ART26201 to beautify the alley, it was just mud, gravel, and a failing retaining wall.

ART26201's Bryson VanNostrand said that the art installation is good for economic development and shows that everyone is welcome in the community.



Projects for 2020:

TRADERS ALLEY ARTS DISTRICT:

- Traders Alley Pavement Marking: Using conventional Department of Highways yellow and white paint, landscape architect **Ashley Kyber** has designed this organic 500 foot long painting on the new alley pavement that will reflect the less rigid rules of Traders Alley. We hope this will be implemented in May 2020.

- **Getaway Car:** In honor of Gray Barker's Men In Black legacy, a 1960 Chrysler Windsor, like the one pictured at left, complete with astrodome console

and rocket tail fins, is currently being restored to be subsequently installed atop a 15 foot structure "flying" over the southern gateway to Traders Alley! We hope this will be completed by July 2020.

THE COLONIAL THEATRE:

- **Sidewalk Entrance:** The Main Street entrance will be restored, including the black and white vintage facade panels. New front doors have already been installed.
- **Interior Updates:** The gallery space, first floor lobby, restrooms, and the main hall will undergo final rehabilitations in anticipation of being a fully useable public space. The **Upshur County Youth Arts** Exhibition will be the first fine art opening in the gallery space this March.
