## 2021 Highlights:

In the past year,



ART26201 partnered with the City to secure an additional \$39,000 grant from the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History in support of the Colonial Arts Center rehabilitation, which brings their total grants up to \$283K.

ART26201 also secured a \$3,960 Rural Youth Engagement through Public Art Grant from the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History in support of the Traders Alley Pavement Marking Project, which took place June 4.

ART26201 partnered with the City to secure an additional \$5,000 gift from **FirstEnergy Foundation** in support of the Colonial Arts Center rehabilitation, which brings their total gifts up to \$20K.

ART26201 hosted the 6th Annual Young Filmmakers Camp July 26-30, with 17 young Buckhannon filmmakers participating.



## **Traders Alley Pavement Marking Event**

On **June 4**, **2021**, landscape architect **Ashley Kyber** and Buckhannon-Upshur High School art teacher **Heidi Thompson** led a hands-on painting workshop with 20 youth participants, ages 14-18, to execute the largest artwork in the Traders Alley Arts District. The free-flowing forms extend the entire length of Traders Alley, from Main Street to Jawbone Park, and also branch out Milkman Lane to Spring Street.

Kyber designed the organic, 600-foot-long painting on the asphalt pavement, which playfully reinterprets highway standards and reflects the less rigid rules of Traders Alley. The work utilizes WV Department of Highways approved




white and yellow traffic paint, as well as a few highlights in red.

# Newly Appointed Colonial Board Holds 1st Meeting

After years in the planning stages, the Buckhannon City Council held a special meeting in April to appoint five members to the newly formed **Colonial Theatre Board**: **Randy Sanders**, City of Buckhannon; **Alisa Lively**, past member of ART26201 and WVWC Dean of Students; **Keith Buchanan**, Buckhannon Community Theatre Past Executive Producer; **Erika Klie Kolenich**, BCT Past Executive Producer; and **John Waltz**, ART26201 Vice President and current BCT Executive Producer.

City Council approved a memorandum of understanding that the day-to-day operations and management of the arts center would be handled by the Board, although City Council will have final say over financial decisions.

In July, Colonial Board Chairperson and ART26201

Vice President **John Waltz** brought forth a recommendation to rename the venue to the **Colonial Arts Center**, which he said would better encompass the multipurpose use of the facility. City Council approved the name change, and the theatre is now known as the **Colonial Arts Center**. The Board holds monthly meetings, open to the public, to further define the operating policies of the new facility.

City Council approved the Board's proposed mission statement for the **CAC**: "The Colonial Arts Center will serve as a community arts hub, facilitating and providing venues for creative and educational opportunities for students, artists, and audience members through diverse programming."


## **CAC Seeks Managing Director, BOE Hires Art Teacher**

At long last, we're so excited to announce that the **City of Buckhannon** is ready to hire a full-time **Managing Director** for the **Colonial Arts Center!** The **M.I.B. Gallery** has been in operation for almost two years, and the rest of the CAC will be ready for use in just a few months. We hope to begin offering youth art programing in June, including the ART26201 **Young Filmmakers Camp** and ART26201 **Young Storytellers Camp**, and more.

In related news, the **Upshur County Board of Education** has recently hired a **full-time art teacher** for the **CAC**! The basement education suite has four teaching artist's studios, as well as four classrooms, and if we are lucky, we will have six creative teaching artists in the CAC on a daily basis in the coming months.

All of this could not have been achieved without the repeated financial support of many of you across the community, as well as the **WV Department of Arts, Culture and History**, **Buckhannon Community Theatre**, and the **City of Buckhannon**.







#### ROBERT VILLAMAGNA

#### **Artist's Statement:**

I create assemblages and metal collages, primarily using found objects, vintage photographs, and repurposed lithographed metal. This printed metal, or "tin", comes from deconstructed product containers, old signage, and vintage metal toys.

I am very passionate about working with found materials, especially those items that show use, wear and rust. I love stuff with character. I often find myself wondering about the person who made these materials, who used them, who held them. I like to think that a part or energy of that person is still contained in these things, and now it's transferred into the artwork. I'm giving that discarded piece of metal, or that old object, a new life, a different life. I am thrilled that I can use this stuff and that it becomes a part of my creative process. These various materials are every bit as much of my palette as is a tray of oils are for a painter. For me, walking through a flea market is like walking through a wellstocked art materials store. The flea market is my palette.

#### WVWC'S FOR MEYER SCHAPIRO PORTFOLIO



Meyer Schapiro, an inspired teacher, lecturer, and scholar, taught art history at Columbia University from 1928 nearly until his death in 1996.

In 1974, twelve of the most significant artists of the day made original lithographs, etchings, and silk-screens that were sold in an edition of 100 portfolios, titled **For Meyer Schapiro**, to fund the endowment of a chair in Dr. Schapiro's name at the department of art history at Columbia University.

A warm friendship connected Dr. Schapiro and renowned modern painter Barnett Newman, who passed away in 1970. **Annalee Newman**, Barnett's widow, made a contribution to the fund and received six portfolios, which she donated to various academic institutions.

In 1976, Ms. Newman learned of William B. Oldaker, chair of the art department at WVWC, from Riva Castleman of the Museum of Modern Art. Ms. Newman was impressed with all of the "good work" he was doing at Wesleyan, and decided to donate one of her six portfolios - edition 36/100 - to the college. Knowing that West Virginia was so isolated from any major art museum, Ms. Newman expressed her strong motivation to "give interested young people the opportunity of seeing as much good art - great art - as they possibly can."

To celebrate this presentation of the **For Meyer Schapiro** portfolio at M.I.B. GALLERY, artist **Chuck Olson**, spoke at the opening reception, providing a brief overview of the significance of the collection.


#### **Artist's Statement:**

The work in Buried Barriers aims to visualize the exhilaration and anxiety induced by uncertainty. I seek out any subject matter and layering processes that allows my studio practice to remain suspended in unsure territory. My process in larger paintings is layered with barriers, or obstacles, that are intended to throw off predictable design choices. These barriers are usually visible as early stages of the images that have been masked off, painted over, forgotten, and unearthed after the conventional composition is nearly finished. The early layers can make or break a composition when they re-emerge, and they demand of me a higher degree of spontaneity and flexibility in the late stages of a painting. I value the tension that comes from painting over the masked off areas, knowing that some of it will be lost in the end.

The elements of uncertainty in my portraiture are found less in the layering process and more in the psychological tension between the figure and the context in which they are presented. These figures are almost always placed in direct juxtaposition with an element of obscuration or abstraction.

#### PRISCILLA ROGGENKAMP

#### **Artist's Statement:**

Working in the studio is a collaboration with and a tugging between ideas and materials. I have form ideas. but so do my materials. I have skills and techniques to use, but my materials whisper ways they wish to go. I mediate the dialogue between us and hope to arrive at some place of agreement. If things go too smoothly, I may not be pushing hard enough. If they are impossible, I may be asking too much. Satisfaction comes in the arrival at a place of agreement and resolution.

In my textile sculptures, I am often asking the question, "What do we carry through life, and how does that affect us?" My sculptures often refer to functional forms used for carrying, such as buckets and luggage. These are containers to be filled and a means of transporting the practical "stuff" needed for many of life's tasks. The works are often human in scale so that they feel familiar and relatable. But they are decidedly not wearable.

With these artworks, I explore the ways in which we carry our loads, with grace, strength, and hope.

#### **ROBBY MOORE**

#### **Artist's Statement:**

Variations on a Mountain Man takes a closer look at the evolution of my figures, specifically those that represent the theme of a man in the mountains of West Virginia. Over the last 18 years, I have used my work to dissect my experience of being a male artist in Appalachia. I have drawn this experience in the human form, as a symbol and character in a narrative. Sometimes with recognizable features and sometimes abstracted to a line of most common denominators.

Upon reflection, there is also a presence of Appalachian culture and practices in process, technique, and media. This anthology of selected works from 2003 to today not only tells the story about a man living in contemporary Appalachia, but demonstrates similarities to the identifier of "mountain man" through a lens of feeling other, and often foreign to the place where I was born and raised.


#### **Artist's Statement:**

This exhibition is a grouping of selected paintings, prints, and collages that represents three different thematic approaches to my own image making. Here are three visual themes based on monuments, columns & paragraphs, and kites. They represent, respectively, my fascination with history, the patterns relevant in narratives, and simple whimsy.

The idea of monuments, as seen in the images Power/ Desire, The Meeting Place, and Rudder, is a reflection on event and preserving memory. Laureate and Cathedral, as well as the accompanying Paragraph images, represent the influence of the printed word where vertical columns and horizontal paragraphs have been the design of our narratives for centuries. The Kite Series of small collage/ watercolors was recently painted while on an extended stay in New Mexico. I have always perceived the kite as a fantastic symbol of hope and promise since I first tried to set one aloft. Kites bring to mind color, pattern, and design with an innocent purpose from which those elements were resonating within the visual culture of New Mexico.

#### **Artists' Statement:**

We are both beginning periods of our lives in which we'll be spending some time away from Appalachia, so it seems appropriate to write some letters home. We are each expressing our love and connection to this place that brought us up, in our respective visual languages.

Jessie speaks through clay and fire. She sources and uses native materials throughout Appalachia to create and record stories of her home and the people in it. She's interested in the stories of people and their connections to the land that they're from. She's wants to celebrate and cherish the connection the people here in Appalachia have to the land and one another.

Nevada speaks through paper and thread, by stitching one narrative to another. She is interested in the way memories become stories, by being told and retold within families and communities, eventually becoming part of the folklore of a place. Even as people are imbuing places with meaning this way, the plants stand witness and give the place color, shape, and life. Nevada's art is a celebration of this symbiotic exchange of meaning that she has witnessed in Appalachia.

Our combined work is a message of gratitude and love for the place we are from, and will always be able to call home.

## 1<sup>ST</sup> Annual Young Storytellers Camp



ART26201 hosted the 1st Annual Young Storytellers Camp, focusing on creative storytelling and performance (with instructors Jason Young, James Froemel, and Doug Van Gundy), June 14-15, at LASCAUX Micro-Theater. Camp drew inspiration from WV author Gray Barker's (of Men In Black fame) salesmanship and his ability to embellish the "facts" of a mundane situation to pique the public's interest. Behind the curtain, Barker was the ultimate story manipulator and left a legacy of unexplained phenomena embedded in the American psyche. Upshur County Schools partnered with ART26201 to cover tuition costs of the day-camp for high school-age students.


